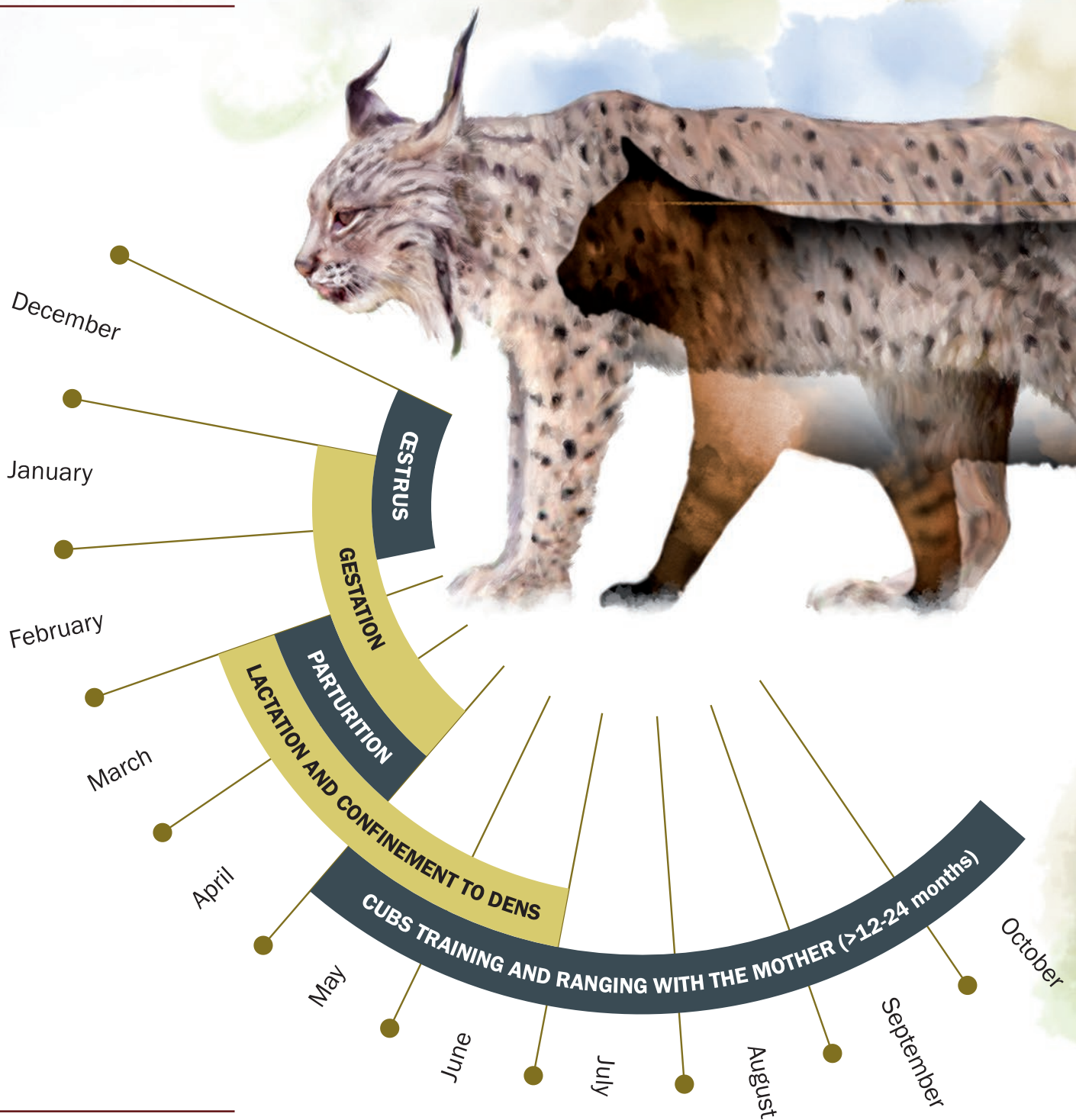

Don't forget that your presence
can impact on their lives

It's your responsibility to look after this area and the animals that live here



If you see a lynx, enjoy this special experience and let it continue on its way without chasing after it.

Stay away from the areas where the females rear their cubs (dens and caves) between March and August.

Avoid forming crowds of people or vehicles in the lynx observation areas, especially during oestrus and reproduction. It's important for the lynx and it will also be a better experience for you.

Only follow tracks and paths suitable for walking. Do not enter unauthorised, restricted or sensitive areas.

Enjoy the sounds of nature - refrain from making loud noises.

Many living creatures take refuge in the dark. Do not disturb them with bright lights.

Slow down in areas where the Iberian lynx lives - both your and its safety are at risk.

If you want to see a lynx or take photos of it, always do so at a **distance of more than 100 meters.**
